



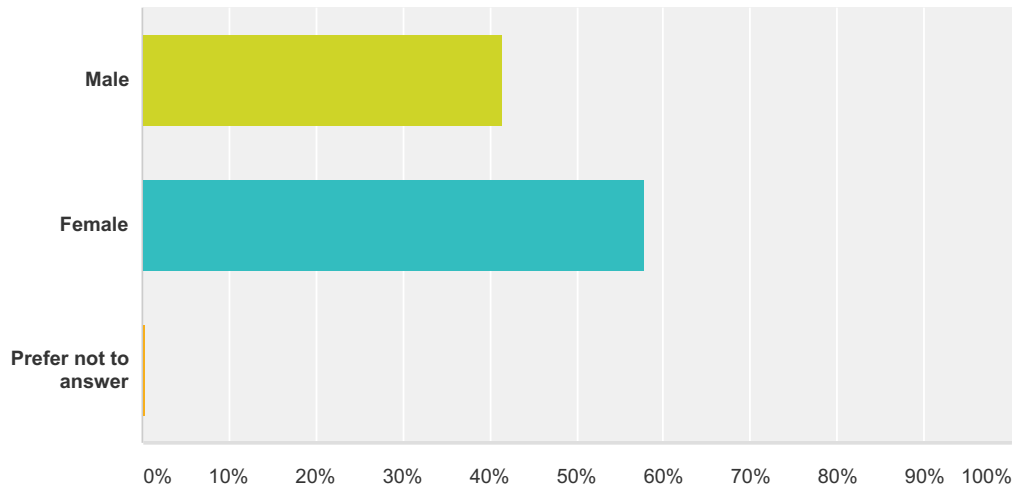

Q1 What is your gender?

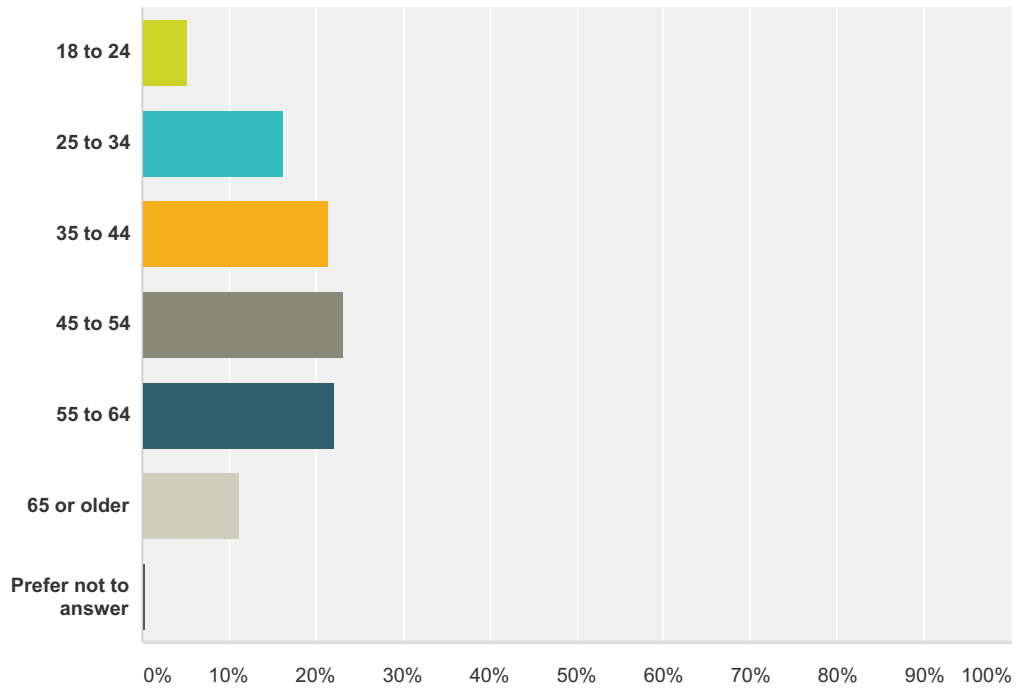

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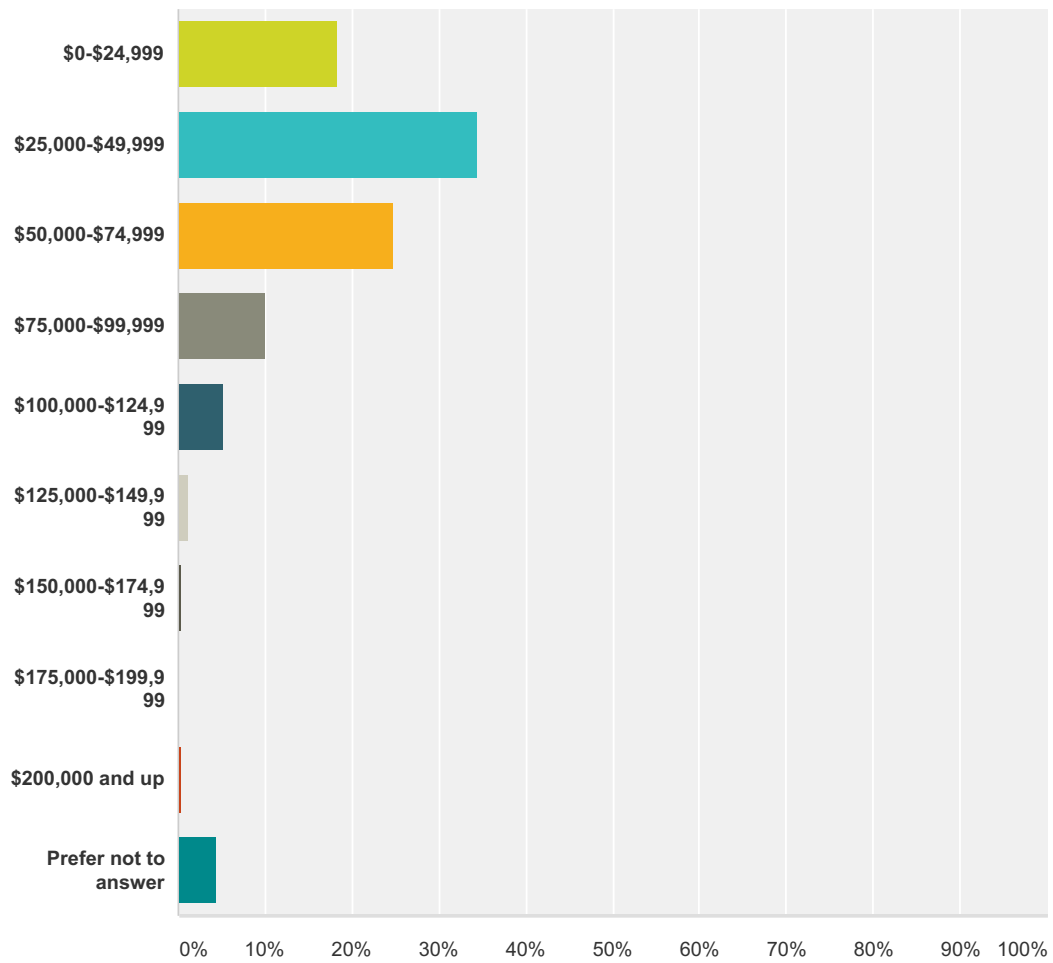

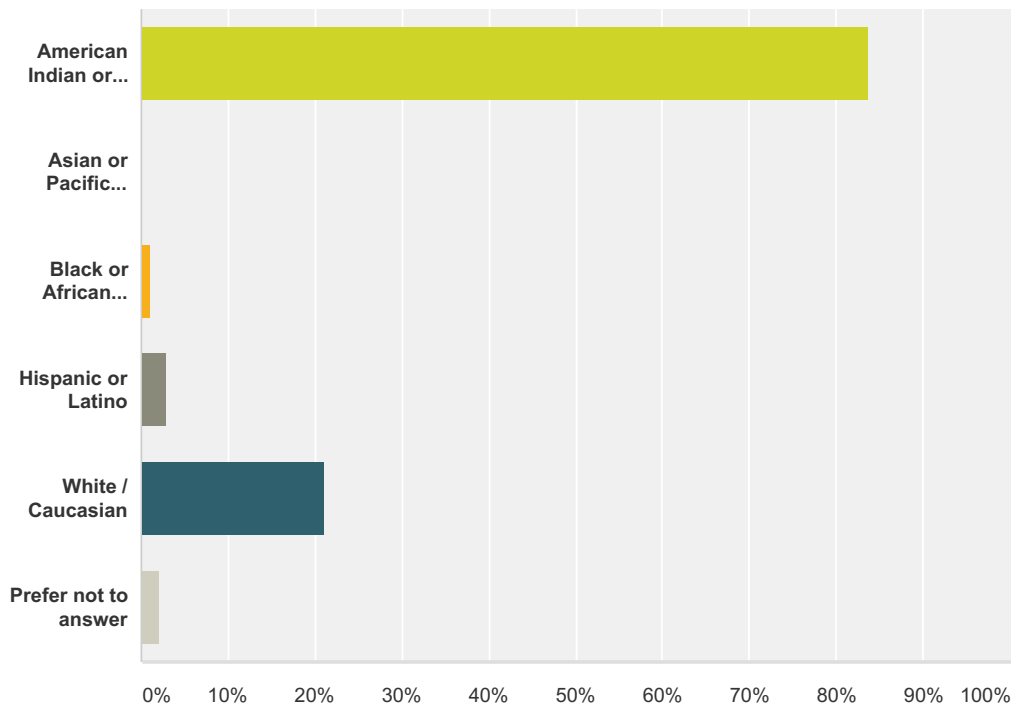

Q5 What is your ethnicity? (Please select all that apply.)

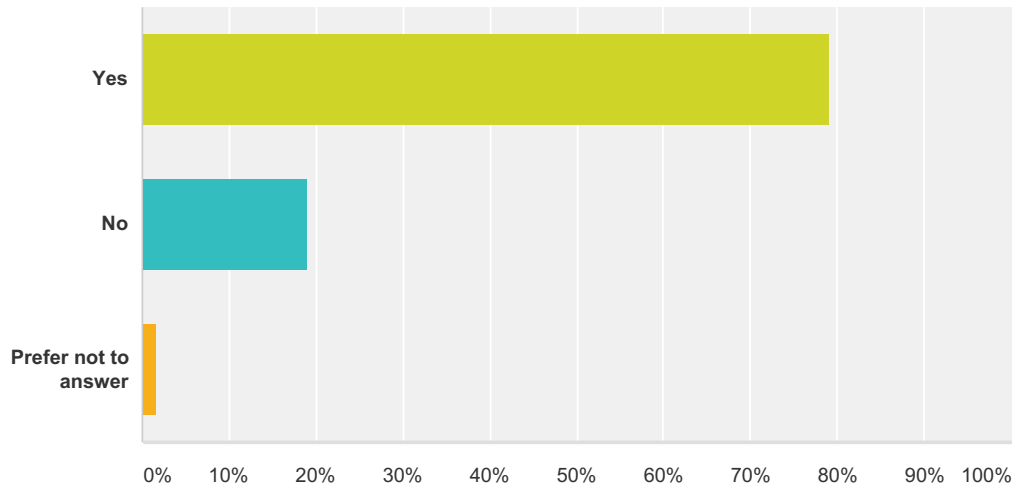

Q6 Are you an enrolled Nez Perce Tribal member?

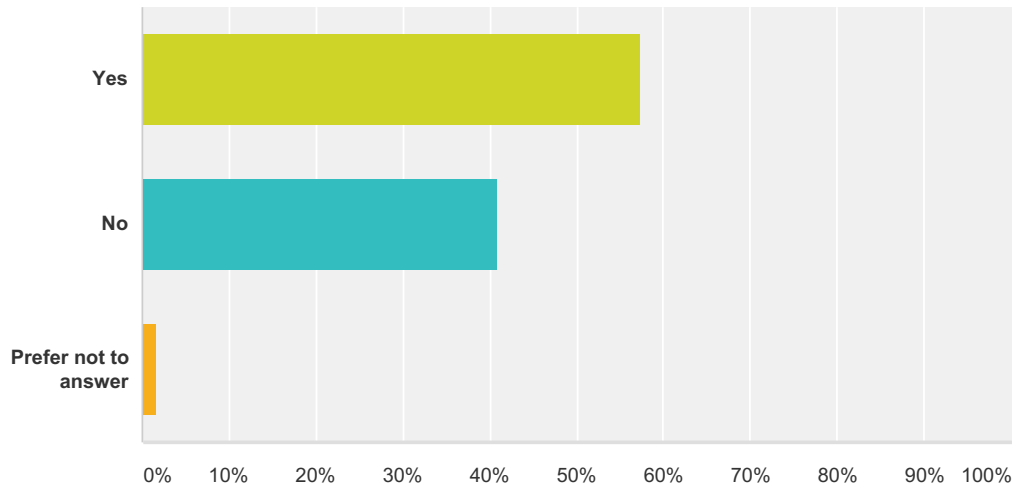

Q7 Are you currently a Nez Perce Tribal employee?

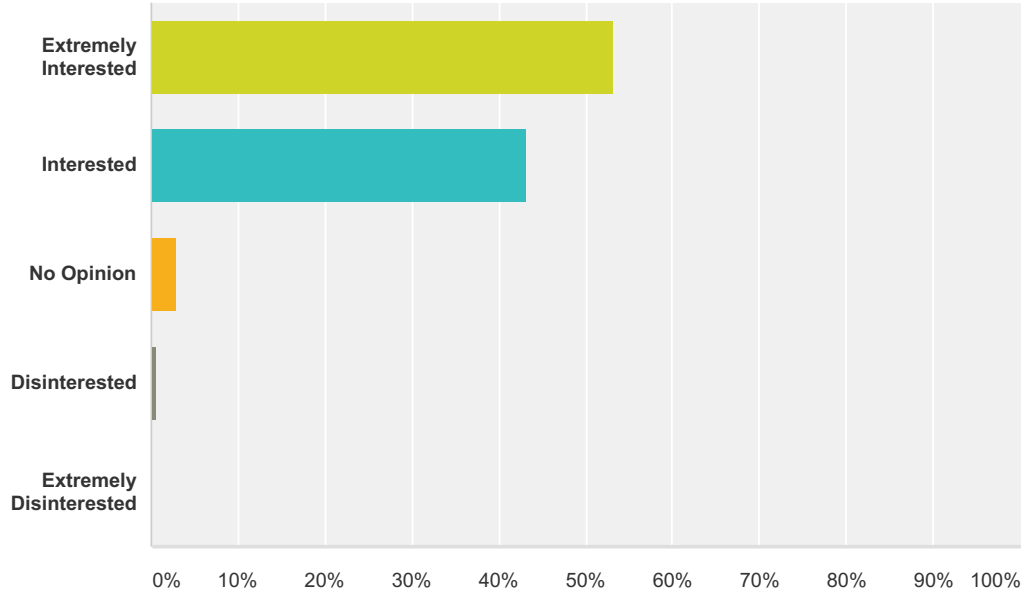

Q8 Overall, how interested are you in the Tribe's on-reservation management of its natural and cultural resources?

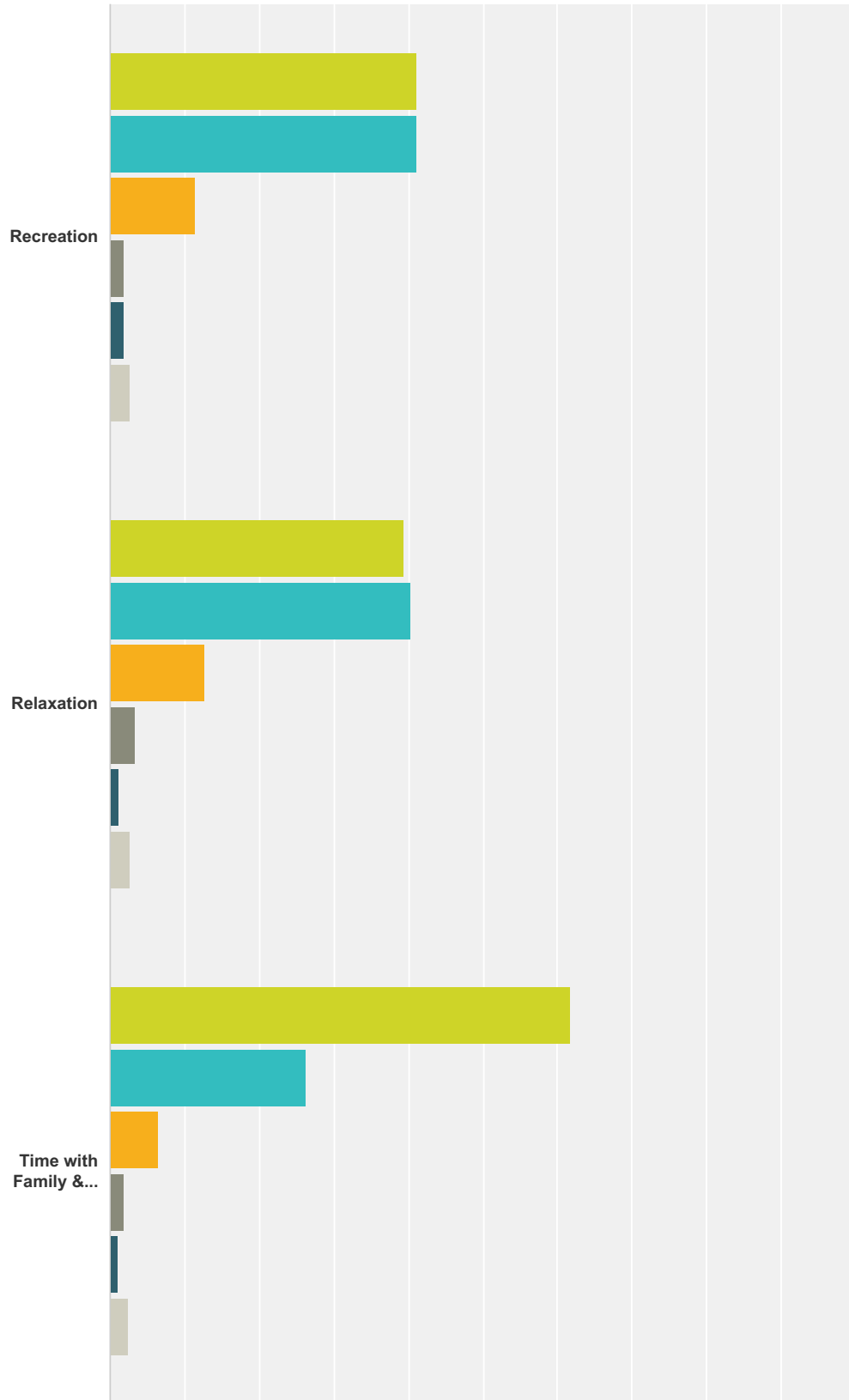

Q11 The Nez Perce Reservation currently contains the following mix of cover types and human land use. Do you feel that these percentages should increase, decrease, or stay about the same?

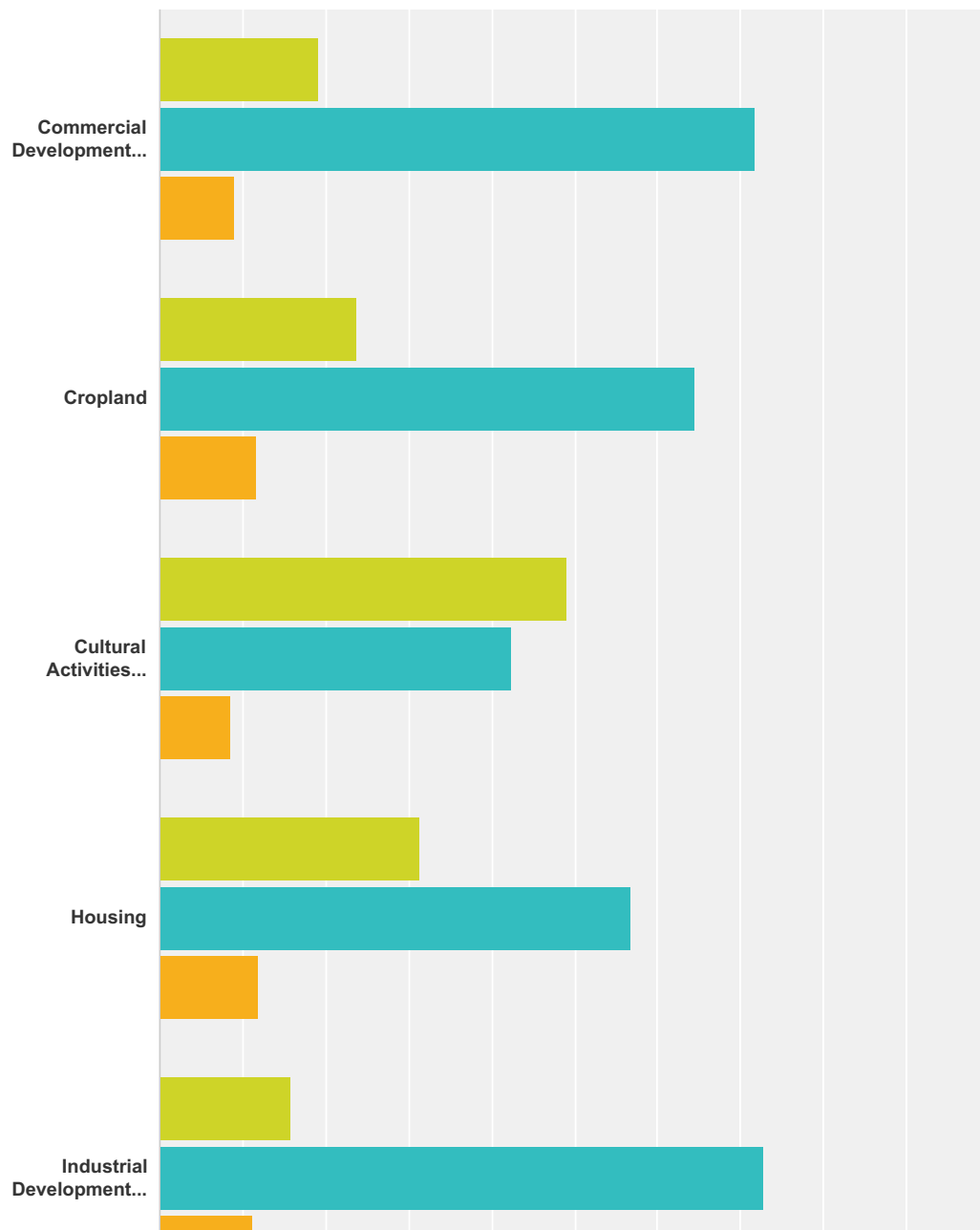

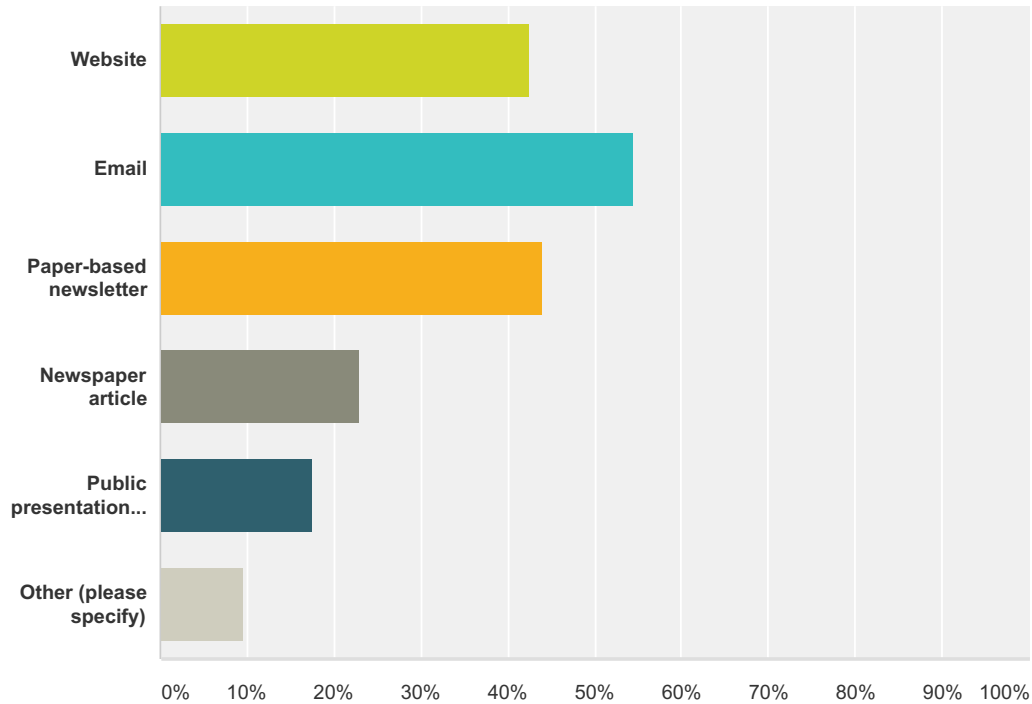

Ensuring Tribal members have a path into leadership positions is the absolute best natural and cultural restoration the Tribes departments can do to ensure a cultural perspective is maintained in the development of our IRMP.
